Doran Arboretum at Murray State

The Doran Arboretum, on the campus of Murray State University, is a fully accessible horticultural display, public garden, and educational laboratory. Visitors come for a peaceful walk around the one-mile path that is surrounded by a diverse collection of plants. The arboretum features a scenic view of a small lake surrounded by pollinator plants to attract butterflies and hummingbirds. Through the honeycomb windows of the apiary, visitors can watch bees buzzing in and out of their hives. Kids can play upon play-pockets that incorporate educational components about nature.

Mahr Park Arboretum

Mahr Park Arboretum, spanning 265 acres in Madisonville, Kentucky, was generously donated to the city by Dr. Merle and Glema Mahr in 2009 and officially opened in 2016. It offers a diverse natural landscape abundant with wildlife, native flora, and recreational amenities. Visitors can explore trails, a Nature Play Area, fishing ponds, a kayak launch, pedal boats, a dog park, disc golf courses, and picnic pavilions. The park also boasts two event barns and the historic Mahr Home. With features like native plant gardens, a 7-acre pollinator garden, a wetland area, and a community garden, it achieved level II arboretum status in 2023, showcasing over 100 woody species. The park's history dates back to the Mahrs' arrival in 1953, their love for the land, and their philanthropic contributions to the community, culminating in the establishment of this cherished arboreal sanctuary.

Western Kentucky Botanical

The Western Kentucky Botanical Garden grows in Owensboro, Kentucky. It is currently the only dedicated botanical garden in the Tri-State Region. The garden has become a center for not only horticultural excellence, but is also a hub of educational programming, various meeting locations and a venue of entertainment events for all occasions- both for youth and adults! The over half-mile paved pathways are accessible to everyone where there is much to teach and learn among the thirteen themed gardens, several significant art sculptures, and, now also included, a historic home from the 1840's. With photo opportunities on every corner, The Western Kentucky Botanical Garden is sure to cultivate beautiful memories as well as enhance each individual's relationship with plant life.

Baker Arboretum

The Baker Arboretum at Downing Museum, established in 1992 by Jerry Baker, spans 115 acres in Bowling Green. Designed by landscape architect Mitchell Leichhardt, it showcases a diverse array of trees, including dogwoods, magnolias, conifers, and Japanese maples, alongside sculptures and water features. With over 600 species and 1500 varieties, it offers year-round attractions, including spring blooms, summer foliage, fall colors, and winter conifers. Visitors can also explore the Downing Museum, featuring works by Kentucky artist Joe Downing and regional talents, free of charge. Noteworthy collections include 80 species of conifers, 100 types of Asian maples, and 150 species of Kentucky native plants, including endangered ones. Recognized with certifications like Monarch Waystation and American Conifer Society Reference Garden, the arboretum supports collaborative research and a university internship program, ensuring continuous growth and activity.



Waterfront Botanical Gardens

The Waterfront Botanical Gardens originated from Botanica, established in 1993 to engage, entertain, and educate the local community about the natural world. In 2001, a bequest from member Helen Harrigan catalyzed Botanica's transformation, leading to the creation of Louisville's Waterfront Botanical Gardens. The Gardens officially opened to the public in 2019. As an urban botanical garden, Waterfront Botanical Gardens is a necessary green space for recreation and relaxation. Their programs and events promote cultural exchange, community connection, and highlight the importance of nature. The Gardens serve as a welcoming space for all, urging collective action to cultivate a stronger, more unified community.

University of Louisville

The University of Louisville's Belknap Campus may be located in an urban area, but the 309 acre, park-like campus has more than 1,100 trees representing a multitude of species. The campus offers the ease of self-guided touring with easy-to-find identification plaques to assist you in discovering the most significant and interesting species among them. The full tour is roughly a 1.75 mile walk and takes only an hour and a half, and will have you feeling like an expert arborist.

Cave Hill Cemetery

Cave Hill, a Victorian-era Cemetery and arboretum in Louisville, Kentucky, boasts a rich horticultural heritage dating back over 175 years. Initially situated on the outskirts of Louisville, it has evolved into a stunning landscape under the guidance of visionary leadership. Recognized for its beauty and historical significance, Cave Hill was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1979. Notably, it houses both the Cave Hill National Cemetery, with over 5,500 military graves, and the city's sole accredited arboretum. The cemetery serves as the final resting place for diverse figures including Mary Ann "Tip" Saunders, Patty and Mildred J. Hill (composers of "Happy Birthday"), Muhammad Ali, Colonel Harland Sanders, Mia Zapata, and Paul Hornung. With over 500 tree and shrub species, including state champion Yellowwood. Cave Hill is renowned for its arboreal diversity.

There is no admission to access the scenic rolling hills and meadows at this family-friendly destination. Creasey Mahan is open 365-days a year from dawn to dusk.

Liberty Hall Historic Site

The Liberty Hall Historic Site in Frankfort, Kentucky, is a National Historic Landmark along the Kentucky River, featuring two houses built by U.S. Senator John Brown: Liberty Hall (1796) and the Orlando Brown House (1835). Both houses display original Brown family furnishings and artifacts. The site offers various tours, exhibits, educational programs, and a museum store. The nearly five-acre grounds boast public gardens maintained for over two centuries, including a four-square garden behind Liberty Hall with historical features and a Mothers' Garden honoring maternal figures.

Newer additions include Euphemia's Butterfly Garden, a food forest, and a pollinator garden. Notable trees on the grounds include Catalpas planted by the Browns in 1800 and subsequent generations, along with sycamores and Kentucky native species, providing a habitat for diverse birdlife. The site also holds historical significance as the location of the first Sunday School west of the Allegheny Mountains.

The Arboretum, State Botanical Garden of Kentucky

The Arboretum, State Botanical Garden of Kentucky, is a 100-acre arboretum and public garden located on the campus of the University of Kentucky in the heart of Lexington, Kentucky. We receive over 500,000 visitors annually who can enjoy and learn about our three main features, the Walk Across Kentucky, the Horticultural Gardens, and the Kentucky Children's Garden.

The Walk Across Kentucky features wild-collected native plants from the seven physiographic regions of Kentucky. The Horticultural Gardens include the Home Demonstration Garden, the Perennial Teaching Garden, and the Flight 5191 Memorial Rose Garden. The Kentucky Children's Garden is a place for children and their families to connect with and learn about plants and the environment.
